The March of Dimes Report Card¹ grades the nation on preterm birth rates, infant death, Medicaid expansion, prenatal care, and more.

#### 1. Health Equity

Increased income does not protect women of color from poor outcomes, as evidenced by high black infant mortality rates. ProgenyHealth is working to level the playing field so that every infant and mother have an equal chance at healthy outcomes regardless of race.



#### 3. Social Determinants of Health

Food, supplies, shelter, safety, and transportation contribute to healthy outcomes. The ProgenyHealth Case Management team focuses on solving broader social challenges for each family we serve.



#### 2. Maternal & Fetal Health

Today, 1 in 10 infants are born too early in the United States. Our UM and CM teams work seamlessly with clinicians and stakeholders to facilitate a collaborative and coordinated approach to maternal and fetal health.




### 4. NICU Care Management
